The first task in the making of a software product is to gather requirements from the client. Besides, it also develops the concepts of static and dynamic modelling and the Unified Process that suggests incremental

and iterative development of software, taking client feedback at every step. The concept of Design Patterns which provide solutions to problems that occur repeatedly during software development is discussed in detail in the concluding chapters. Two appendices provide solutions to two real-life problems. Case Studies, mapping of examples into Java code that are executable on computers, summary and Review Questions at the end of every chapter make the book reader friendly.
