## **HIV/AIDS and Society in South Africa**

Recent trends in the field of Economics have led to renewed interest in the teaching and learning of Economics. According to the Curriculum and Assessment Policy Statement of the South African Department of Basic Education, the teaching of Economics intends to empower learners to become responsible citizens who can use their resources wisely. This suggests that Economics must be taught to equip learners with skills, knowledge and values of how best they can use limited resources to improve their socio-economic conditions. For this reason, good leadership is needed to support Economics teachers in schools. Such leadership requires knowledge and understanding of the context in which the teaching and learning of Economics take place. Against this background, this study sought to examine how heads of departments (HoDs) use contextual intelligence in leading the instructional programme for Grade 12 Economics. A qualitative research methodology, based on a case study design, was followed in collecting data through semi-structured interviews with Economics HoDs and teachers purposively selected from three secondary schools in Riba Cross District, Limpopo province.

Findings suggest that HoDs experience contextual challenges in leading instructional programme for Grade 12 Economics and tend to have little understanding of how contextual intelligence can assist in dealing with challenges affecting the effective teaching and learning of the subject in their schools.

### **A Century of Geography at Stellenbosch University 1920-2020**

The emergent so-called “Fourth Industrial Revolution” is regarded by some as a panacea for bringing about development to Africans. This book dismisses this flawed reasoning. Surfacing how “investors” are actually looting and plundering Africa; how the industrial internet of things, the gig economies, digital economies and cryptocurrencies breach African political and economic sovereignty, the book pioneers what can be called anticipatory economics – which anticipate the future of economies. It is argued that the future of Africans does not necessarily require degrowth, postgrowth, postdevelopment, postcapitalism or sharing/solidarity economies: it requires attention to age-old questions about African ownership and control of their resources. Investors have to invest in ensuring that Africans own and control their resources. Further, it is pointed out that the historical imperial structural creation of forced labour is increasingly morphing into what we call the structural creation of forced leisure which is no less lethal for Africans. Because both the structural creation of forced labour and the structural creation of forced leisure are undergirded by transnational neo-imperial plunder, theft, robbery, looting and dispossession of Africans, this book goes beyond the simplistic arguments that Euro-America developed due to the industrial revolutions.

Countries everywhere are divided within into two distinct spatial realms: one urban, one rural. Classic models of development predict faster growth in the urban sector, causing rapid migration from rural areas to cities, lifting average incomes in both places. The situation in South Africa throws up an unconventional challenge. The country has symptoms of a spatial realm that is not not rural, not fully urban, lying somewhat in limbo. This is the realm of the country's townships and informal settlements (T&IS). In many ways, the townships and especially the informal settlements are similar to developing world slums, although never was a slum formed with as much central planning and purpose as were some of the larger South African townships. And yet, there is something distinct about the T&IS. For one thing, unlike most urban slums, most T&IS are geographically distant from urban economic centers. Exacerbated by the near absence of an affordable public transport system, this makes job seeking and other forms of economic integration prohibitively expensive. Motivated by their uniqueness and their special place in South African economic and social life, this study seeks to develop a systematic understanding of the structure of the township economy. What emerges is a rich information base on the migration patterns to T&IS, changes in their demographic profiles, their labor market characteristics, and their access to public and financial services. The study then look closely at Diepsloot, a large township in the Johannesburg Metropolitan Area, to bring out more vividly the economic realities and choices of township residents. Given the current dichotomous urban structure, modernizing the township economy and enabling its convergence with the much richer urban centers has the potential to unleash significant productivity gains. Breaking out of the current low-level equilibrium however will require a comprehensive and holistic policy agenda, with significant complementarities among the major policy reforms. While the study tells a rich and coherent story about development patterns in South African townships and points to some broad policy directions, its research and analysis will generally need to be deepened before being translated into direct policy action.
