**A Temporary Future: The Fiction of David Mitchell**

Having emerged as one of the leading contemporary British writers, David Mitchell is rapidly taking his place amongst British novelists with the gravitas of an Ishiguro or a McEwan. This biography of Malcolm Muggeridge traces the varied life of one of the most brilliant and controversial men of the twentieth century. The author, Ian Hunter, was given full access to all of Muggeridge's unpublished material, letters, and diaries. The result is an objective, well-researched, and honest account that is

sometimes at variance with Muggeridge's own recollection of events. Ian Hunter captures the humor, the intellect, the rawness of perception, the abandoned honesty of a man engaged in knowing himself, his world, and his God. Malcolm Muggeridge was not merely a "vendor of words," as he invariably described himself, but was also a celebrated author, broadcaster, lecturer, debater, traveller, journalist and television personality, a one-time ardent admirer of the Soviet system, a World War II intelligence agent, and a former agnostic turned committed Christian. It is to the credit of Ian Hunter that after reading this biography one has a clearer understanding of an extraordinary man. Dr. Ian Hunter is professor emeritus at the University of Western Ontario. His articles and reviews have appeared in many Canadian and American publications. He edited two collections of Muggeridge's writings: *Things Past* and *The Very Best of Malcolm Muggeridge*; he also wrote a biography of Muggeridge's friend, Hesketh Pearson (*Nothing to Repent: The Life of Hesketh Pearson*).

The area described in this study is located off the western coast of the north central Great Northern Peninsula of north-west Newfoundland. After an introduction on the geographic setting of the area, previous research, and the general geology & stratigraphy of the area, this report describes the area's Cambrian and Ordovician rock units, with information on their lithology, stratigraphic relationships, distribution, palaeontology, age, and depositional environment. This is followed by a section on geologic structure, including details of faults. The final section covers the area's economic geology and includes a history of mineral exploration, discussion of mineralization in Cambrian carbonates and in the St. George & Table Head groups, and data on industrial minerals (potassium-bearing shales, limestones, dolomites). The appendix contains descriptions of measured stratigraphic sections.
